## **NEW RIDER:**

As a Department of the Air Force (DAF) military member there are requirements you must meet before riding a street motorcycle. These requirements are laid out in DAFI 91-207, additional requirements may be added by your MAJCOM or installation.

Requirements: The DAF is committed to reducing the risks inherent to riding a motorcycle. Therefore, in addition to legal requirements of having a valid motorcycle license, endorsement or learners permit, military members operating a street bike 50cc or greater are required to attend specific training and briefings. To assist riders with understanding and meeting these requirements each unit has a Motorcycle Safety Representative (MSR).

- 1. Speak with your commanding officer or his/her representative to receive an initial safety briefing. Frequently the appointed representative is the unit MSR.
- a. Normally the unit MSR is the best place to start.
- b. If you PCS or change assignments under a new commander, you will need to repeat the initial safety briefing.
- c. Be sure to see if there are additional requirements set by your MAJCOM or installation.
- 2. Create an AFSAS account by logging into a computer with a Common Access Card (CAC) reader and visiting: https://afsas.safety.af.mil
- Contact your MSR for help with creating an account.
- 3. Be properly licensed, endorsed or have a valid learners permit for the class and size of motorcycle.
- 4. With a learners permit you need to attend an approved Basic Riders Course, like the Motorcycle Safety Foundation's BRC®.
- 5. Within 60 days but, no longer than 1 year of attending basic rider training, or becoming a rider, you need to attend an intermediate training course.
- 6. Upon successful completion of your intermediate training you are now in a sustainment category.
- a. Enter all training into your MUSTT record for proper credit.
- b. You are required to attend an annual rider's safety briefing and refresher training every 5-years.
- c. You need to keep your AFSAS/MUSTT account active, log-in every year.

- 7. Changes in assignment, motorcycle, or extended period away from riding may trigger additional requirements.
- a. When you do not ride for an extended period of time or change your motorcycle, it is recommended you attend training to familiarize yourself with the motorcycle's handling.
- b. If you PCS or change assignment to a different commander you will need to be briefed by your new commander or MSR.
- 8. If you decide not to ride and no longer have a street motorcycle, log into AFSAS and change your settings so you are no longer an active rider.
